Abraham Lincoln: A President Who Led Through Crisis

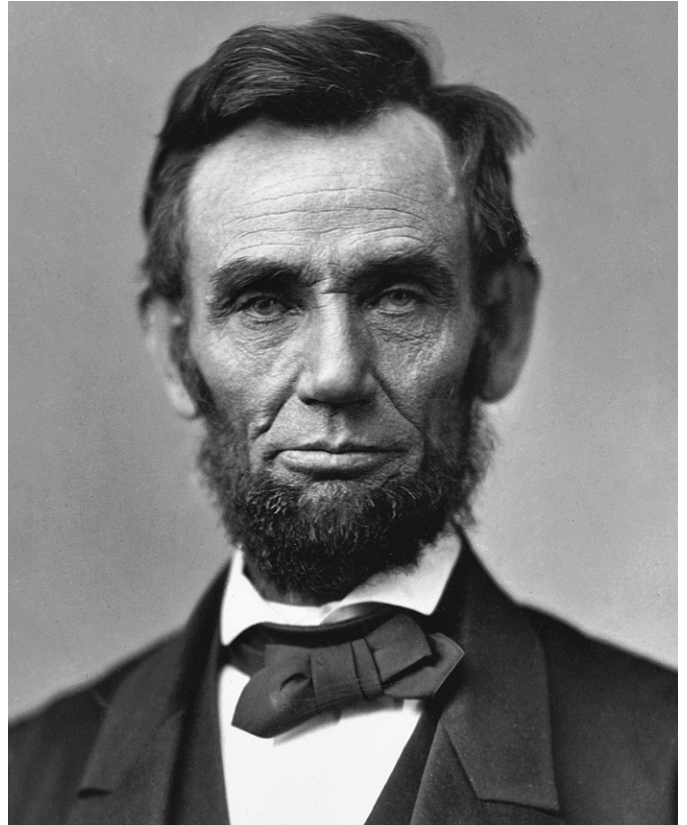
Abraham Lincoln was the 16th president of the United States. He was born on February 12, 1809, in Kentucky. Lincoln grew up in a poor family and spent much of his childhood living in a small log cabin. He had very little formal schooling, but he loved to read and learn. He often borrowed books and studied whenever he had free time.

As a young man, Lincoln worked at several jobs. He was a store clerk, surveyor, and lawyer before entering politics. Lincoln became known for his honesty, strong speaking skills, and belief that slavery should not spread into new parts of the country.

In 1860, Lincoln was elected president. Soon after, several Southern states left the United States. This led to the Civil War, which began in 1861. The war was fought between the Union in the North and the Confederacy in the South. Lincoln believed it was important to keep the country united.

In 1863, Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation. It declared that enslaved people in areas controlled by the Confederacy were free. The proclamation also made ending slavery an important goal of the Civil War.

Lincoln was also famous for the



Gettysburg Address, a short speech he gave in Pennsylvania in 1863. In the speech, he honored soldiers who had died and reminded Americans about the importance of freedom and equality.

The Civil War ended in April 1865. Just days later, Lincoln was assassinated while attending a play at Ford's Theatre in Washington, D.C. He died on April 15, 1865. Today, Abraham Lincoln is remembered as a leader who helped preserve the United States and took important steps toward ending slavery.
